Ticket touts face ban under new Government plan



The government is set to ban reselling tickets for profit, cracking down on touts who hike prices for gigs, theatre and sports events. Stars like Sam Fender, Dua Lipa and Coldplay pushed for the change, which will stop tickets being sold above their original price and could save fans over £100million a year. Resale platforms will also be legally required to enforce the new rules. Campaigners say it's a huge win that puts tickets back in the hands of real fans.


