Autocorrect is corrected

Big tech has made a small change that means a lot. Thanks to the "I Am Not a Typo" campaign, Microsoft has updated its spell-check so thousands of real names are no longer marked as mistakes. Many names from African, Asian, Welsh, and Irish backgrounds are now recognised properly. Campaigners hope this shows how technology can be more inclusive, and how speaking up can lead to real change.
