Rare surprise: Kind polar bear mum adopts a cub

Researchers in Canada have spotted a mother polar bear doing something very rare - caring for a cub that isn't her own. She was seen during the polar bear migration near Churchill - a place famous for polar bears - walking proudly with two cubs by her side. Scientists from **Polar Bears International** say this kind of adoption almost never happens and has only been recorded a handful of times.

Having a caring mother greatly helps cubs survive, especially as climate change makes life harder for polar bears.
